




Why is it important to describe a setting in a story?




Describing a setting is important because it helps the reader picture where the story is taking place. Effective setting descriptions can evoke a mood, influence how the characters behave, reflect the world the characters live in and, most importantly, immerse the reader in the story.

Let's read an extract of a setting on the next slide. It's taken from a book called 'Heart of Darkness' written in 1902 by Joseph Conrad...






An empty stream, a great silence, an impenetrable forest. The air was warm, thick, heavy, sluggish. There was no joy in the brilliance of sunshine. The broadening waters flowed through a mob of wooded islands; you lost your way on that river as you would in a desert, and butted all day long against shoals, trying to find the channel, till you thought yourself bewitched and cut off for ever from everything you had known once—somewhere—far away—in another existence perhaps."






This extract is taken from a section of the book when the narrator is travelling up the River Congo in Africa to find a man who runs an isolated trading post in the jungle.









When describing a setting, it's always a good idea to try and use your five senses to help describe the setting:


- What can you see?

You don't need to include each of the five senses in your descriptions but including two or three will really help immerse the reader in your setting.

















These two descriptions describe the same setting.
